The main purpose of the assessment is to help Yukon Education, schools and school planning councils evaluate how well students are achieving basic skills, and make plans to improve student achievement. LIBRARY COMMONS

What is a Learning Commons?

As I lead our school with our transition from a library to a learning commons, I often think about - and get asked - the question, "What is a Learning Commons?" I like to think of it as 'A Library Plus,' meaning that we will always have physical books and e-books and we will also offer the space and services for other learning/teaching options. Below I have shared portions of an article that will provide more information.

What is a Learning Commons, Anyway?

As we work to build twenty-first learning skills...collaboration, creation and communication we need to look at how we can support this by creating an environment that meets that need. The Learning Commons concept takes libraries that one step further to support digital students and learning.

What is a Learning Commons?

"Keechlin, Rosenfeld and Loerttscher define it as "a learning "space" that is both physical and virtual – a place to experiment, practice, celebrate, learn, work and play. Gino Bondi, in his blog post Our Learning Commons: One "How To" for 21st Century Learning says that "It is a transformation that calls for physical, virtual and, pedagogical changes as well as a shift in mindset for all players."

How is it different from the traditional school library?

Traditional school libraries are seen as quiet places full of printed books, people reading and librarians 'shushing'. A Learning Commons takes school libraries into the 21st century. Yes, we still have printed text, and there are still people reading, and there is still a librarian, however the Learning Commons has so much more! There is a hum of activity with students talking, learning, searching for information on a variety of devices, focusing on content creation and synthesizing of information. The Learning Commons becomes the hub and the heart of the school; a place for teachers and teacherlibrarians to collaborate to build inquiry learning and critical thinking skills in students; a place for technology integration and experimentation; a place that is 'owned' by students and staff alike.



- Turn on your radio to CKRW (610) on the AM dial or (96.1) on the FM dial; or on the FM dial at CBC (94.5) or CHON (98.1); information and directions will be given over the radio.
- DO NOT call the school; we must have the lines open for emergency calls.
